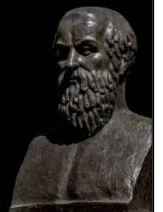

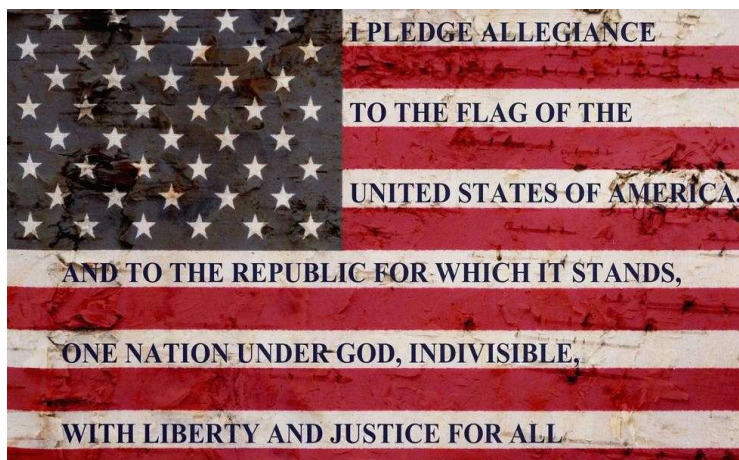

Benjamin Franklin, Freemason, Founding Father

Printer, author, editor, inventor, scientist, diplomat; founder of schools, postal systems, government; ambassador, wit, speaker; philosopher, politician and Freemason, he was not only the amazing intellect, the Voltaire of Colonial America, but one of the most complex and gifted men of all times. He was the Francis Bacon of his age, far ahead of the years in which he lived, and as such, the subject of criticism from those who did not understand him. The famous epitaph he wrote for himself barely conceals the Masonic theme of immortality as told in our Legend: "The body of B. Franklin, Printer (Like the cover of an old book Its contents torn out And stripped of its Lettering and Gilding) Lies here, Food for the Worms. But the Work shall not be wholly lost; For it will, (as he believed) appear once more, In a new and more perfect Edition, Corrected and Amended By the Author."

Benjamin Franklin had everything that a reformer should have, except the desire to reform for the sake of the reformation. He improved everything which interested him, but he never tried to force his improvements into the lives of others. He could show a world a new way of making glasses, and that lightning comes down a kite string, and that daylight saving time adds to leisure, and that wit and humor win more causes than arguments, but he did not try to "make laws about it." He improved the printing press, the army and navy, the common stove, ideas of ventilation, paved Philadelphia and made it a better lighted town, invented a hundred gadgets for common living, such as a three wheel clock, a combination library chair and step ladder (they can be bought to this day) an artificial arm to get books from a high shelf, "but he never tried to improve or change or alter Freemasonry."

A NATION WORTH APPRECIATING

On July 4, 2026, the United States of America will commemorate the 250th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. This historic occasion should be more than a celebration of the past. It should be an opportunity to reflect upon the principles that gave birth to this nation and to consider our responsibility in preserving and strengthening them for future generations.

I became a citizen of the United States through naturalization, but I have always considered myself an American in the broader geographical sense. I was born in Colombia, on the continent of South America, and later made my home here in North America.

I came to the United States because it was - and continues to be - a prosperous nation filled with possibilities. It is a country built upon laws, liberty, individual rights, and the belief that opportunity should not be limited by a person's birthplace, background, culture, or social position.

Those principles are among the reasons I love this country. They are also principles that must never be taken for granted.

The promise of America is not that every citizen will think alike. The promise is that people with different experiences, beliefs, origins, and political philosophies may live together under a common system of laws and work toward a more prosperous future.

UNITY DOES NOT REQUIRE UNIFORMITY.

We do not need to agree on every political, religious, or social matter to recognize that we share the same communities, face many of the same challenges, and desire safety, dignity, opportunity, and prosperity for our families.

As we commemorate 250 years of American independence, our purpose should not be to deepen the divisions between right and left. Our purpose should be to discover how individuals with different ideologies can work together toward one common goal: the benefit of all.

A MASONIC REFLECTION

I joined Freemasonry in pursuit of knowledge. I wanted to better understand why so many influential individuals throughout history became Masons. I wanted to study the principles that guided their actions, their sacrifices, and their understanding of liberty, independence, responsibility, and government.

The Freemasons of earlier generations did not merely inherit a system. Many of them helped imagine and construct one. They lived during periods when questions of freedom, self-government, religious tolerance, education, and human dignity were urgent matters. They understood that liberty could not exist without personal discipline, moral courage, civic responsibility, and an educated population.

Their tools were not only the square, compasses, level, plumb, and trowel. Their tools were also knowledge, reason, dialogue, organization, brotherhood, and service.

We live in a different time, but the need for those tools remains. Our work today may not be the establishment of a new republic, but we are still called to build. We must build stronger men, stronger families, stronger Lodges, and stronger communities.

RETURNING TO PURPOSE

Freemasonry carries an extraordinary history, but history alone is not enough. An institution must not only remember its purpose; it must practice it.

We should ask ourselves: Are we helping our Brothers become more educated? Are we helping them become financially and personally stable? Are we supporting their families during periods of illness, unemployment, grief, or hardship? Are we creating opportunities for mentorship and professional growth? Are we using the experience, knowledge, and connections within our Lodge to help one another prosper? Are we serving our community in a visible, organized, and meaningful way?



Brotherhood should be more than sharing a meal or attending a stated communication. Brotherhood should mean that no worthy Brother walks alone when facing a serious struggle.

The prosperity of a Lodge begins with the well-being of its members. When Brothers are educated, stable, productive, and supported, they become better husbands, fathers, leaders, citizens, and servants of the community. Our network should be a network of encouragement, accountability, knowledge, and opportunity.

A Brother who possesses experience should teach. A Brother who has succeeded should mentor. A Brother who has connections should help open appropriate doors. A Brother who is struggling should be able to ask for guidance without humiliation. A Brother who has fallen should be helped to stand again.

This is how we apply the working tools of Masonry to the living stone.

THE WORK BEFORE US

The 250th anniversary of the United States provides Solomon Lodge No. 20 with an opportunity to renew our commitment to Masonic and civic service.

Let us commemorate this anniversary not only with flags, speeches, and ceremonies, but with action. Let us encourage education. Let us promote civil dialogue. Let us support our Brothers and their families. Let us serve veterans, young people, seniors, and neighbors in need. Let us create mentorship between generations. Let us strengthen the bonds between men of different backgrounds and opinions.

Let us demonstrate that disagreement does not require hatred and that diversity of thought does not prevent unity of purpose.

THE WORKING TOOLS FOR OUR TIME

As Masons, we are taught to meet upon the Level. On that Level, wealth, profession, nationality, political affiliation, and social position do not determine a man's value. His character, conduct, and commitment to truth are what matter.

THE LEVEL	The nation and the Lodge belong to all who accept the responsibilities that accompany freedom.
THE PLUMB	Live uprightly, even when public passions tempt us away from principle.
THE SQUARE	Deal honestly and fairly with those whose opinions differ from our own.
THE COMPASSES	Restrain the passions that divide us and keep disagreement within due bounds.
THE TROWEL	Spread the cement of brotherly love and affection through service, encouragement, and unity.

These teachings are not relics of another century. They are urgently needed in our own.



BUILDING THE NEXT 250 YEARS

We inherited a nation built through sacrifice, courage, imperfection, debate, conflict, reconciliation, and continuous improvement.

Our responsibility is not to pretend that America has always fulfilled every ideal it proclaimed. Our responsibility is to continue working so that its reality comes closer to those ideals.

The next chapter will not be written by historical figures whose portraits hang in government buildings or Lodge halls. It will be written by the citizens, families, communities, and institutions living today. It will be written by us.

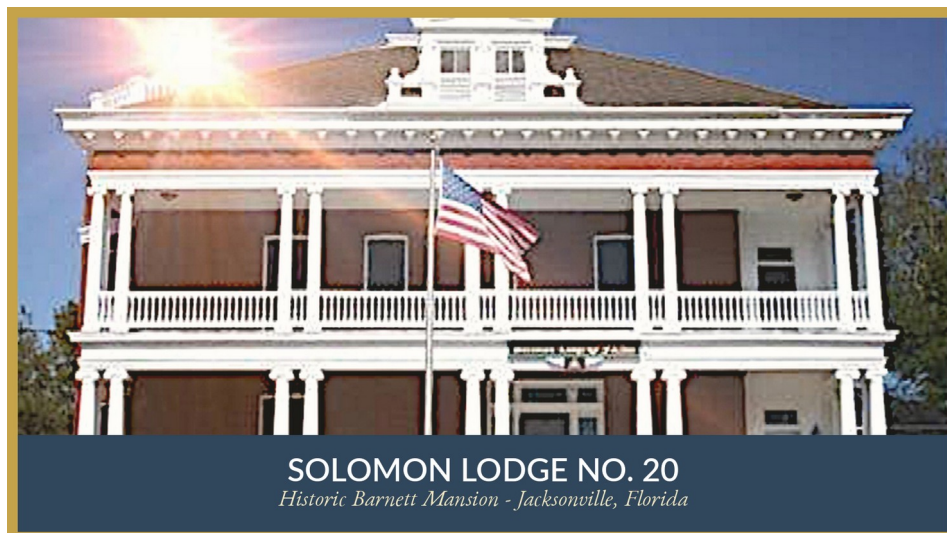
Different stones may have different shapes, origins, and purposes, yet when properly prepared and placed, they strengthen the same temple.
